


In September 2023 John Grimshaw of the charity Greenways and Cycle Routes was invited by local environmental groups to look at a proposed route from Cliff End to Rye. Compared with the eastern end of the Military Canal where Kent Council and Hythe have made excellent and popular paths along the course of the canal, this western end is benignly neglected and scarcely used by comparison.

These notes sketch out how a route might be created to take in parts of the canal, Winchelsea and the Levels.

This would create a way suitable for all. And one far removed from the hazard of traffic along the Pett Level Road.







Advisory cycle lanes on this short section of the main road would allow cyclists to reach the Town via Pipewell Gate, whilst cycling down towards Rye would hardly conflict with traffic Dipewell Gate Bridge The existing path is a very attractive way of climbing the hill to Winchelsea. A narrow stone surface would allow cyclist s to walk up the hill. Triary Greyfriars Wickham Rock Lane is a most attractive road with a relatively gentle gradient. It makes for much the best entrance to the Town from the west, Dimsdale Sewer Dickbam A route along this section of lanor the Military Canal path would bypass Winchelsea Join the canal and is best left as it is

Winchelsea once stood on a narrow peninsular surrounded by sea and Marsh. The only land entrance was from the west and defended by New Gate. This historic Town must be the focus and the central point of any route between Rye and Cliff End. We cannot bypass it just because it stands so high on its cliff top. The map shows the most practical options including advisory cycling lanes on a short length of the main road.

As well as taking in the Town, its pub and other attractions, this attractive route bypasses a long length of the Military Canal. This would continue to be the course of the Saxon Shore Way, which at this particular location below Friars Cliff is an accurate description of the medieval shoreline.
